THE NEWS FROM PETERSBURG

From the Petersburg Express of yesterday we make up the following summary:

All was namentally quiet up to half past six o'clook Monday erecting, on a part of the enemy's liors. On other portlors of the lines there was heavy aktamishing but nothing more.

SURLLING THE CITY.

All the day long, at lolevals of every fire minutes, his shell were thrown icto the city. We heard of a little bricks and mortar bing displaced, the parencies term up lat two or three streets, and in one instead in one instead a large store door on Systemore strict was mibiged. But we heard of no fright to life or limb yesterday, and the enemy probably threw up aggregate of one bundred and fifty or mine shells into the city's limits.

THE FLAGO F TRUCE.

The flegs of truce sent in by the deemy Sn. day, was forwarded by Meade, He desired the pritting of burning his deal. For obvious reasons, which it is not necessary here to meetin, General Bearrand conteously, but peremptorily declined to grant the requests.

THE ENEMY'S STRENGTH.

An ordinarily intelligent Tenton, who fell into our hands Saturday night, gave a statement of Grant's forces, which is believed to be in the main, correct. He says Grant's army now on the South' side of James river is composed of the Second. Pifth, Ninth. Touth, Eighteen h and Twentleth corps. The Second, commanded by Hanccek; the Fifth by Warren, and the Minth by Burnside, are all operating immediately around Petersburg --The E ghteenth, commanded by Baldy Smith, is at and near Bermuda Hundreds. The Tenth and Twentieth have no regular commanders, and are h ld near City Point as a reserve. All these srmy corps have been fearfully reduced since the commencement of the present campaign, and many of the regiments composing them do not now muster two bundred mon.

LATEST.

Last evening about, seven e'clock the enamy was the solution of double his pickets on four extreme letting generally sure indication of an estack on his part. Up to one o'clock this morning no engagement had occurred, but there was much picket firing going on.
