## REPORTS OF THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

### FROM PETERSBURG.

PETERSBURG, July 2.—There was some firing last night on our lines from batteries seven and ten, on the eastern side of the city, resulting from a supposed advance of the enemy on Jenkins' front whilst his men were relieving pickets. The firing lasted about thirty minutes, and amounted to little or nothing.

There is nothing doing to day but shelling on the part of the enemy.

[LATEST FROM NORTH GEORGIA—YAN-  
KEE LOSS THREE THOUSAND—ARMS.  
AMMUNITION AND PRISONERS CAP-  
TURED—ENEMY BURYING HIS DEAD.]

MARIETTA, June 28.—The engagement yesterday with General Hardee's corps was the most brilliant of the campaign.

Cheatham pressed in with an enfilading fire, killing and wounding over one thousand, losing but thirty-seven killed and wounded.

Cleburne lost seventeen killed and wounded, disabling a third of the enemy, whose total loss is over three thousand.

While the woods were burning, Lieutenant Colonel Martin, of the First Arkansas, shouted to a Yankee Major to cease firing and save their wounded.

While the enemy took off their wounded, we gathered up a large number of arms and ammunition; one hundred and fifty prisoners were captured in all, we losing about thirty. This is semi-official.

Only sharpshooting occasionally and shelling from Kennesaw mountain to-day.

The enemy are busy hauling off their wounded and burying their dead.—*Augusta Chronicle.*
